### **Blessings**






### The Meaning of Advent

During advent, which begins this year on December 3, many churches and family use wreaths to symbolize watchfulness and increasing joy as Christmas approaches. Colors for the candles vary, with some traditions using blue (for hope and creation) and others preferring purple (for royalty, humility and penitence.)

The four candles each represent a week in Advent also signify hope, peace, joy and love. (The third candle is often pink.) In the center is the white Christ candle, representing Jesus as the light of the world. That candle is lit on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

The round, green Advent wreath has special meaning of its own. It symbolizes eternal life and the unending love of God, who sent His only son to earth to die in our place.

## Small packages, great things

The motto for Hershey's Kisses used to be "Big things come in small packages!" That also could be a motto for Bethlehem, for Baby Jesus and, indeed, for us. It's an important message to remember when we fear we're too weak to fix the world's problems, too small to fight the gigantic terror that threatens a loved one or too lacking in abilities we see in others.

"But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah," God declares through the prophet Micah (5:2, NRSV), "from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel." Bethlehem was a mere village. God's ruler for Israel started as an infant. His birthplace was a small stable, not a palace or temple. But size isn't everything. Big — that is, great — things can come in small packages. And thanks to the tiny baby who grew up to share immeasurably huge love with the world, God can do great things through you, too!



The message of the poem "What can I give Him" by Christina Rossetti is that the speaker is unable to offer anything of material value to Jesus. The poem suggests that if the speaker were a shepherd, they would bring a lamb, and if they were a Wise Man, they would do their part. However, since they are neither, they can only give their heart<sup>1</sup>. The poem is often interpreted as a call to give oneself to God and to live a life of faith and devotion<sup>2</sup>.

What can I give Him poor as I am?
If I were a shepherd I would bring a lamb;
If I were a wise man, I would do my part.
Yet what can I give Him? Give Him my heart.

### The Letter "J"

Is the first letter in the Name of Jesus, our Savior. (Read Matthew 1:21.)

### The Color Red

Reminds us that Jesus is the Gift of God's love. Reminds us that Jesus shed His blood for us. (Read John 3:16 and Revelation 1:5.)

### The Stripes

The large stripe reminds us of the cross on which Jesus died. Three small red stripes remind us of His sufferings from the whip on His back, the crown of thorns on his head, and the nail wounds in His hands and feet.


