July 29th through August 1st, Barbara Henderson, Nikki Mazza-Fredley, and Marci Mazza-Fredley attended the 2023 General Assembly entitled the **KINDOM OF GOD: WITHIN US AND AMONG US** in Louisville, KY. "KINDOM" is not a typing error. The theme of the Assembly was that we are all "kin" to each other regardless of our gender, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, or citizen status. The theme exemplified our Disciples of Christ identity statement: We are Disciples of Christ, a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world. As part of the one body of Christ we welcome all to the Lord's Table as God has welcomed us."

What does this mean? We honor the heritage of Christian unity by staying together in covenant as a witness to the world that even when we disagree we can still make room, welcoming all to the table as Christ has welcomed us. Our spiritual ancestors were fond of saying, "unity, not uniformity." (disciples.org)

One of the challenges that was given to us is to confront Christian Nationalism. "Christian Nationalism is a cultural framework that fuses a radically exclusionary form of Christian identity with the public political and civic participation of a nation's citizens. It upholds white supremacy, xenophobia (hatred or fear of outsiders. This can manifest as hostility toward immigrants, but it can also manifest as hatred toward members of another tribe, culture or religion.), and heteropatriarchy. It asserts that power belongs in the hands of persons who are white, natural-born citizens as stated in the background information of GA-2341, Calling The Church to Oppose Christian Nationalism. This resolution was adopted at the General Assembly. For more information on Christian Nationalism or the General Assembly, please see me, your pastor.


OCTOBER





Welcome them into your home. Don't wait for an invitation.


eXpend yourself, not them

BACK TO THE HEART OF WORSHIP

We are creatures of habit. If we don't find ways to remind ourselves why we do what we do, we're prone to just go through the motions, if not adopt some new underlying motivation altogether. Which can be especially dangerous in worship.

For singer and worship-leader Matt Redman, this lesson came in a remarkable experience that was both personal and corporate. In the late 1990s, the preaching pastor at Redman's church in Watford, England sensed that their worship gatherings were going flat spiritually, that the congregation was going through the motions, and worship wasn't flowing from the heart like true Christian worship must.

"There was a dynamic missing," says Redman, so the pastor did a pretty brave thing. He decided to get rid of the sound system and band for a season, and we gathered together with just our voices. His point was that we'd lost our way in worship, and the way to get back to the heart would be to strip everything away."

During this season, the pastor challenged the congregation to be participants in worship, not consumers. To come ready to engage with God for themselves, from the heart, not just watch with their eyes. He wanted them to come as worshipers, not as concert-goers. With the band and the sound system gone, it made for an unforgettable time in the life of the church as they sang a cappella only—and for an unforgettable lesson about worship.

"Before long," says Redman, "we reintroduced the musicians and sound system, as we'd gained a new perspective that worship is all about Jesus, and he commands a response in the depths of our souls no matter what the circumstance and setting. 'The Heart of Worship' simply describes what occurred."

The essence of worship is not the many good externals, but heart and head. Spirit and truth. Our spirit stirred by the Holy Spirit, in worship over true things about God, his Son, and his gospel.

The heart of worship is our heart, delighting in Jesus and expressing praise to him for all the true things that Scriptures teach us about who he is and what he has accomplished for us. It is, then, "all about" Jesus, not us. It involves us, but we're at the periphery. He's at the center. He's the focus. It's his commands we consider first, not our preferences. Redman's song is about refocusing, and re-centering, and reminding ourselves why we worship—and who we worship.

Jesus is greatly honored when we bring ourselves, with the Holy Spirit's help, back to the heart of worship. (David Mathis. Excerpted from DesiringGod.com)
