But the passage could have a deeper meaning. Although Eli had turned a blind eye to his sons' sins and neglected his duties, God knew that Eli could still be a divine instrument. God knew not to turn off Eli's light. God was expecting Eli to still shine brightly for him, and eventually Eli figured out that Samuel, his young charge, was hearing God's voice. So if your light seems dim or even burned out, be assured that your pilot light remains on! God has left the light on not just *for* you but also *in* you.

## HOT MEAL MONDAY

The Monday Meal crew members (aka "The Christian Cookers") are looking forward to the beginning of a new year. We served over 1,400 meals in 2022, and new people continue to find their way to the outside food pantry and to our door for a warm meal.

This year, we are hoping to make the task a little easier by purchasing a new refrigerator and stove for the upstairs fellowship hall. The new appliances will be housed in the room's alcove where tables and chairs are now being stored. During the past year, we have had to use the ovens in the downstairs kitchen or a borrowed roaster oven to keep the food warm. Crockpots have often lined the serving table as well. It has been challenging and has, at times, limited the types of meals that we could serve.

The purchase of the new appliances is possible due to a grant from the National Benevolent Association that was applied for by Pastor Janet. The Association uses funds "to provide grants for projects serving older adults and educating youth and young adults." Through Pastor Janet's efforts, the church was awarded a \$5,000 grant.

Of course before moving forward, we need to see what the addition of the new appliances will entail. We will keep you posted on the progress. -The Monday Meal Crew

The free hot meals are continuing on Mondays and has been very busy. We thank all our cooks and our helpers.

We’ve have had a good, busy year and are so very grateful to be able to continue these outreach programs. We appreciate all the love, support and prayers for this ministry.

### Biblical Love Notes

The following compliments from the Song of Solomon may not go over well on Valentine's Day: "I compare you, my love, to a mare among Pharaoh's chariots" (1:9). "Your hair is like a flock of goats, moving down the slopes of Gilead" (4:1). "Your teeth are like a flock of shorn ewes that have come up from the washing" (4:2). "Your neck is like the tower of David, built in courses" (4:4). "[Your] eyes are like doves beside springs of water, bathed in milk, fitly set" (5:12). "Your navel is a rounded bowl that never lacks mixed wine. Your belly is a heap of wheat" (7:2). On the other hand, how about this one: "You are altogether beautiful, my love; there is no flaw in you" (4:7).



### Beyond Candy Hearts and Roses



The first half of February seems dominated by pink and red, cards and candy. But people not in a loving romantic relationship can sometimes feel left out of the festivities. Of course, all people need love — and certainly love is not limited to the romantic kind. Author Leo Buscaglia, who became known as "Dr. Love" for writing about the topic, said, "Too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment or the smallest act of caring, all of which have the potential to turn a life around." Jesus taught that loving one another is second only in importance to loving God (Matthew 22:37-40), and that when we love one another, God lives in us (1 John 4:12). There are so many ways to do that — beyond candy hearts and roses! But Valentine's Day is as good a reminder as any.
